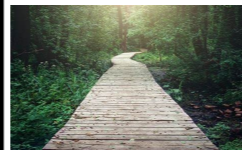


Linking Faith-filled and Hopeful to prayers of the Church and Liturgical Season.

Prayer suggestions and activities:

- Pray to the Holy Spirit and learn about the fruits and gifts of the Holy Spirit.
- Pray on the feast of St. Thomas More and St. John Fisher (June 22nd), may we show the courage of faith that they did.
- Pray that we are inspired by the life of St. Peter and Paul (June 29th) to share our faith with others as they did.
- For the world: We pray for recovery from COVID-19.
- Pray for those around the world who suffer persecution.
- Pray for those who are denied their human rights.
- Pray for those who are leaving Primary education and are beginning their journey in Secondary school.
- Pray for the Martyrs of the Church who gave their lives for the future of the Church.
- Pray for those who engage in missionary work around the world. We pray that they communicate the Gospel message effectively and people receive the message with openness.

Linking Faith-filled and Hopeful to scripture, meaning and teachings of the Church, Pope Francis and the Saints.

Scripture to Explore: -

- Mark 4:26-34 Explore the scripture of the mustard seed. Can you explain why this piece of scripture has been chosen to illustrate the Virtues contained within the CSPP?
- Explore the Cardinal virtues of Faith, Hope and Love (sometimes called charity) that we receive at Baptism. What are your hopes for a better world in the future?
- Explore the words of Pope Francis: *'Amid so much darkness, we need to see the light of hope and to be men and women who bring hope to others.'*
- On June 29th we celebrate the witness of St. Peter and St. Paul. Research how they lived their lives to enable the early Christian Church to grow.

Live it



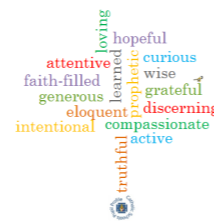
Linking Faith-filled and Hopeful to the way we can choose to live our lives to serve God and to serve others.

Activities, Challenges and Discussions.

- Vocations: Explore how your vocation will help you become men and women for others.
- Write a prayer or lead a Collective Worship on the theme of faith-filled and hopeful.
- St. Paul is the Patron saint of Missionaries and Evangelists. How can you share your faith with others?
- Support a younger child in school by helping them grow in faith by being a prayer partner, reading them a Bible story or by showing them the loving face of Jesus.

Linking Faith-filled and Hopeful to artwork



The Catholic School Pupil Profile (CSPP) tag cloud is linked with the parable of the mustard seed from St. Mark's Gospel. The young people in our schools are like the small seed. With care and encouragement and good teaching they grow tall and put out big branches, attracting the birds of the air.

If you look closely at the image, you can see a Goldfinch perched on one of the branches. Since medieval times, the goldfinch has been used as a symbol of Christ. The legend has it that when Jesus was on the cross, a goldfinch tried to pluck the thorns from the crown on Jesus' head.
